Cameron completed the Level 3 Extended Diploma in Uniformed Public Services programme at the College. And now, after 14 weeks of hard work, he has officially completed his initial Army Air Corps training.

Cameron said, "This is my dream come true, my mum was in the Army Air Corp and I grew up watching helicopters taking off and coming in to land so naturally I always wanted to be a pilot."

"Now I'm qualified as an Air Trooper, I will be based in the School of Army Aviation in Middle Wallop to continue my training. Over the next few years when I have hopefully progressed enough in the ranks I should be put forward for pilot training."

Cameron's programme organiser at the College said, "All of us are so proud of Cameron, his confidence has come on leaps and bounds in the two years he's been with us."

"The programme Cameron was on is designed to help learners prepare for the interview process for the armed services. As well as improving your fitness level, you will have practice interviews with current personnel and complete tailored units including Current Affairs and International War & Conflict."

Cameron added, "Without my tutor's input, advice and support I wouldn't have been able to complete the Army's initial training. I would recommend this programme to anyone who is thinking about a career in the armed services, it's the perfect preparation."



Nicole's Journey

Why did you decide to study at Coventry College?

I had several options on where to attend college and decided to attend Coventry College based primarily on the academic reputation for the Level 3 Public service programme I wanted to study. I found opportunities for personal growth and development not only academically, but also through the experience of my tutors. I knew they would guide me by giving me opportunities throughout regarding a career for when I finish my studies.

How has your career developed since leaving Coventry College?

When joining Coventry College I always had a clear idea of what career I wanted to go into. I always wanted to be a police officer. I knew this would be hard work and entail a lot of commitment and dedication. Since leaving college I went into different jobs to gain experience with the public and learn crucial aspects in society that I would need to be successful. I applied for the police and needed 50% to succeed but unfortunately only got 40% at the final stage. This was disappointing after all the hard work I had put in but I always remained positive. I attended five different interview stages for the police and even though I didn't succeed it gave me the confidence and experience to attend all interviews with my head held high. Today I am a prison custody officer and I love my job. My programme didn't go to waste, although I am not a police officer, I proudly work in the public services sector supporting our community in keeping everyone to our ability safe just like I would have done in the police.

What programme did you study, and what did you enjoy the most?

While at Coventry College I studied Level 3 Sport and Level 3 Public Services. I really enjoyed my time and would go back in a heartbeat. There was always something different to look forward to. Our group bonded very quickly with the help and experience from our tutors, who always made sure every task was

fun and enjoyable to suit all the needs of the learners. During the programme we went on more than one residential, these were always affordable and gave me opportunities that I would not be able to do outside of college. The friendships and memories I made still remain today. Regarding the work load of the programme, it was brilliant as we were always given enough time and knowledge to complete all the assignments. If I was stuck, the help from the tutors was always an email away.

What was the most important thing you learned at Coventry College that has helped you in your career?

The most important aspects I learned at Coventry College was to be kind to one another. I came out with average grades from school and gained the highest grade in my Public services Programme, as I got all the support I needed to complete my work to the highest standards and go further into my career. I learned valuable communication skills, which is very important in my job role today as it could cost someone their lives. I have learned the importance of time management and how to conduct myself in the correctly.

What advice would you give to those following in your footsteps at Coventry College?

As far as life lessons go, you won't always succeed the first time and you will find aspects of the programmes difficult and you don't always end up the career you originally thought. The advice I would give is to remember never to give up and keep pushing for what you want to succeed in no matter how many setbacks you may face. Always ask for help even if you feel like it's a silly question because someone else in your programme may be in the same situation as yourself and not have the confidence to come forward.
